A preview of new titles published in March 2022


This month's selections are particularly broad in scope, taking on subjects ranging from capitalism to race and social isolation.

rguably all books are a reflection of our societies and cultures but none more so than the five books I've highlighted as editor's choices this month. Get under the skin of capitalism by way of influencers in Get Rich or Lie Trying, explore past and present in Deep South in The Trees, delve into the first anthology of Kurdish speculative fiction ever published in English in Kurdistan + 100: Stories From a Future State, devour race and social isolation in Woman, Eating and unpick the roles of women in society in When Women Kill.

We've also got a bumper poetry spotlight this month with more than 20 titles from publishers including Verve Poetry Press, Smokestack, Prototype and Cinnamon Press. Highlights include a book-length poem called "Little Dead Rabbit", which is the result of a collaboration between poet Astrid Alben and graphic designer Zigmunds Lapsa, a bilingual anthology featuring Welsh poets that celebrates translation and language, and another collaboration between Kwame Dawes and John Kinsella that explores history, looking at public events and the literary imagination. There's also the collection from Gay's The Word bookseller Erica Gillingham. Onwards!

From the Costa Book of the Year shortlisted author comes a book that follows young Stalin, who is in London for a conference of Russian communists. With Lenin, Trotsky, and Rosa Luxemburg, among others, he battles to keep the party radical, while dodging the attentions of the czar's secret police.

It follows her from her birth as the daughter of the "King of the North" to her disastrous union with the notorious Earl of Bothwell—and her lasting legacy to the Earldom of Sutherland.
